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Across the Pond



We have returned from our adventure (for the moment) of a lifetime ... our trip to Germany via Iceland. It is good to be home, but there is so much more we could have seen and done ... another time, perhaps.

Germany is full of history – you’ll have to ask Pastor Jon about that “stuff” because history is not my forte and he lives and breathes it! Despite my lack of enthusiasm for “history” I will say that their history goes back hundreds and hundreds of years (remember, we celebrated the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in 2017!), and to be in those places that are so old is mind boggling. Many don’t “show” their age, many have stood the test of time, many show the struggles and strife they endured centuries ago, there is beauty in their stories, there is sadness in their stories, there is tragedy and horror, there is tenderness and peace.

When I was in Germany 26 years ago, I remember heavy, dirty air from the pollution of diesel cars and trucks. I did not see that this time. Our tour guide talked about how they emphasize nature and keeping things natural. We were surprised to see so many solar panel fields as we drove through the countryside.

Things are compact there – the cars are small, their homes are mostly apartments and are thus small, they do not have lavish, expansive yards by their homes, the buildings are very close together, farms are small and appear to be family farms where the barn is attached to the home (the living space).

Bicycles are everywhere! Women in skirts and dresses, men in business suits, small children sitting in boxes attached to the front of the bicycle being transported by their mothers, wheelchairs with a bicycle tire in the front, racks upon racks of bicycles in front of office buildings, bicycles obeying the traffic signals of the automobiles, taking their place in the lanes of traffic amongst the cars and trucks, maneuvering around stopped busses picking up passengers, being transported on the trains from one city to another. Even in a thunderstorm, they don their rain jackets and ponchos, fighting the wind and blowing rain on their commute home – it is a sight to see!

Everywhere we went the cathedrals were huge and ornately decorated with paintings on the ceilings and walls, with gold accents throughout. It gave me goosebumps standing in the Town Church in Wittenberg where Martin Luther preached and in the Castle Church where he nailed the 95 theses on the door 500+ years ago. Can you imagine being in that space, walking down the same streets, past the same buildings that he did? A highlight for us was being able to attend an English language worship service at the Castle Church, singing “A Mighty Fortress” only feet away from Martin Luther’s grave. And, Pastor Jon was asked to read the lesson from Romans for the service, his voice echoing throughout the mass structure ... now how cool was that!! Goosebumps!

We met nice people, not only in our tour group, but the local people in general were friendly and welcoming. Most spoke English or could understand enough to engage in conversation or sell their product. The food was good, we were introduced to specialties in various regions of the country (ask Rebecca about schneeballen from Rothenburg), and of course the beer couldn’t be better!

As I reflect on the trip, I am struck by all that we saw; so much, that at times it was overwhelming. There are so many stories to tell, so many memories to cherish. Pastor Jon is

busy sorting through the 2,500 pictures he took, organizing them, researching things that piqued his interest, getting them ready to share with anyone who may want to learn more about the cathedrals or sights of Germany.

God is present across the back fence, across the street, and across the pond.

Please note: As the year progresses and the kids have their 4th birthday, feel free to join the class any time!

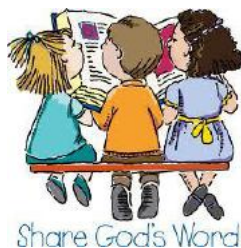
Sunday School Teachers and Helpers

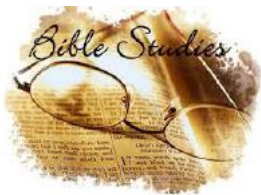
We will gather at church at 10 AM to carpool downtown.

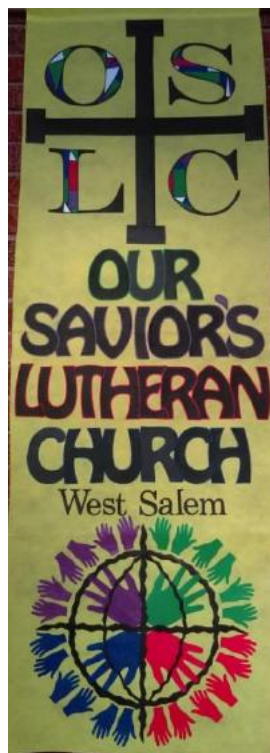
From Nancy ...

In June I had the privilege to represent Our Savior's by attending the Synod Assembly with several other members of our church. Since it was my first time to attend I really was looking forward to the experience.

The first gathering was as Our Saviors on Division St. in La Crosse. Each church in our synod had made a banner representing their church and these had been hung from the cathedral ceiling in the church. It was a stunning display of talent and devotion to our work as a church body, beautiful to see. Jane Frank had made the banner for our church and it was beautiful. We need to thank her for sharing her talent.

Each day was filled with beautiful music, meaningful devotions and a first-hand look of everything that goes into the workings of keeping our church communities running effectively and keeping Christ Jesus at the center of it. After all that is what the assembly is all about, God's work, our hands.

I learned much from participating in this, enjoyed it and would do it again. I ran into several people from other towns and congregations that I knew, which was fun and interesting, getting to share ideas with them and hear their views. It is a large world but then isn't when you get out



there and meet others you already know and they share your beliefs, it makes you feel connected to something much larger than yourself and your church.

From Eric & Lynette ...

The 2019 LaCrosse Area Synod Assembly was held June 14-16 at Our Saviors Lutheran Church La Crosse and UW-La Crosse Student Union.

The theme of the Assembly was Walk.Love.Do. The theme was centered around the bible passage from Micah 6:1-8.

The music was led by Felix Malpica, an ELCA pastor at Faith Lutheran Church in Janesville, Wisconsin. At the age of 14, he began assisting with music at Synod Assemblies and later served as a counselor at Sugar Creek Bible Camp. The music was multicultural, full of energy and joy of the Spirit.

Reverend Dr. Craig Nesson, Professor, Wartburg Theological Seminary, was the keynote speaker. His messages were thought provoking and intriguing.

Several offerings of workshops were held. I attended a workshop regarding homeless teenagers in Holmen Wisconsin. Journey Lutheran members shared that the Lutheran Churches in Holmen had joined together to provide personal care supplies for those in need. They continue to work with the schools to aid these students.

A workshop regarding the work of the Coulee Council on Addiction and personal experiences with addiction were shared. Narcotic prescription writing has changed in La Crosse County due to the coalitions from the Coulee Council. The change is decreasing the amount of narcotics patients are receiving after procedures to three days of medication instead of 30. This is decreasing the amount of narcotics left in homes able to be obtained by those addicted. Police are also accompanying meals-

on-wheels delivery volunteers in hopes of collecting expired medications and medications no longer being used.

A La Crosse police officer spoke about his work as a community servant and how being a Christian influences that work.

From Wendy ...

I very much enjoyed the Assembly this year, it gave me a chance to have another experience to compare it with from last year.

I took away from this Assembly that we strive to have an all is welcome church, how our churches reach out to the community for support and help each other out. We heard about the donations and the intergenerational giving. We do have a long way to go but we are moving in the right direction, but we need to keep the motivation going. I do know we can't help everyone but one person at a time is great.

I also very much enjoyed the music that was provided, it was all about the variety to experience the differences of languages and how it can move you to greatness. I learned that we have a lot of English words to mean the same of other languages and how few they have.

I can say I enjoyed it more this year than last year. I walked away feeling motivated to help with the changes. Thank you for allowing me to go again this year.

God's Work Our Hands...

50th June Dairy Days

We appreciate all of you who volunteered with the June Dairy Days Fun Run and the Food Stand. The weather was questionable with storms to the north and south during course set up but West Salem had perfect weather by race time! The weather scared a few so our runner numbers were about half. We appreciate the work of those helping set up, assist along the route, and clean up. Also, thank you to the grillers, servers, cashiers, and window workers who volunteered their time in the Food Tent. Helping with June Dairy Days is a great way to be present in the community.

From the Outreach Committee (we thank them also for all of their hard work and time commitment for this!)



Highlights of the Las Mates, Dominican Republic Medical Mission, March 2019

26 volunteers from La Crosse (1 MD was an OB-GYN from Washington State) went on this mission. Dr. Ben Jarman,

General Surgeon at Gundersen, was our team leader/Medical Director. There were 8 MDs and 4 RNs, 3 anesthetists, 2 OR techs, 1 pharmacist, and 1 spiritual leader.

We sang in Spanish "Alabare" (all praise and glory to God) in front of the hospital with patients and staff before starting work every day at 8am. We got to work in air conditioning at the hospital which was a blessing. Every day the surgery area was without water and flushing toilets from mid-morning 'til quitting time. A lot of antibacterial gel for hands was used. IV solution left over and soap was used, if available. The surgical team did a total of 111 procedures. Some were minor excisions and others were done in the operating room. 22 were gynecological surgeries. I and 2 other RNs did all the pre op and post op care of the surgical patients. The medical team went out to rural areas by bus with their supplies and saw a total 357 adults and children. The dental team saw 106 adult patients. A total of 148 eye patients were seen for exams or glasses. The patients were so thankful for everything that was done for them. Often surgical patients went home on a motor cycle. These people have to be tough to do that. Some patients arrived very early in the morning and were not seen 'til 4:30 PM and they never complained.

Days were warm but cooled down at night when you usually only needed a sheet for covering. We ate breakfast and supper at the camp. At the hospital, lunch was a sandwich eaten when you could find time. There were prayer group times before breakfast and in the evening. Prayers were before each meal and anyone could volunteer to do the prayer. Before supper, we usually sang a short hymn. Every morning Paco would play "One Day at a Time Sweet

Jesus" on his boom box to make sure we were up and ready for the day. A rooster started crowing at 2:30 AM every day and that got dogs barking so I did not sleep very well.

The camp had dorm rooms with bunk beds 3-4 beds to a very small room. Mosquito netting was over all the beds or cots. The male volunteers slept on cots or in tents on a balcony. We did not have hot water for bathing very often and no paper in the toilets or there was overflow of sewage. Yikes!

It was an enlightening experience making me very thankful for our healthcare in America. I especially appreciated the conveniences of home such as flushing toilets and hot water for bathing.

A special "Thank You" goes out to members of OSLC who donated money, hygiene items, crayons and coloring books, etc. All donations were so appreciated.

Our Savior's Mission in the World

*God's Work...Our Hands...
Lutheran Campus Ministry*

Another in a series of ministries in which we are engaged as part of our faithful stewardship and discipleship.

Lutheran Campus Ministry-La Crosse (LCM) serves the campuses of UW-L,



Western Technical College, and Viterbo University. Partnering with United Campus Ministry, sharing the facilities of Common Ground, and under the leadership of Pastor Ben Morris, LCM seeks to engage young adults in the midst of some of the most challenging and chaotic years they will encounter – college life!

Our Savior's supports LCM financially. Through our support we make a real difference in the lives of young adults. Some are life-long Lutherans, some come from other traditions, and some are new to the faith. For all, LCM is a place of both challenge and safety. They discover God's call to faithful living, but also God's gifts of grace in Jesus Christ. All of this is experienced in the context of a community that seeks to nurture and grow faith and faithful living.

Students at LCM worship together every Sunday evening, gather for Bible study and reflection, reach out to other students who are searching and sometimes hurting, and explore the world through mission trips. Most of all, they seek to be a voice of welcome and healing in a very broken world!
