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Pastor's Reflections ...

A Lovely Thought and a Challenge!

In mid-October I attended our Synod's annual Fall Theological event in the Wisconsin Dells. A new venue, a new route to travel, a shortened event, a dynamic speaker, a fun excursion, and a chance to be with colleagues – reconnecting with “old” friends and meeting “new” ones.

In an effort to get to know her audience, the speaker invited each person to share with the group something that is lovely and something that is a challenge, either in life or in ministry. I think we all listened thoughtfully as each person shared, many opening themselves and becoming vulnerable in the safe space of colleagues.

Throughout our time together, colleagues connected, reached out, and offered support to those who were hurting, whose challenges were overwhelming, who needed to talk to someone who understood.

It didn't have to be a room full of clergy – some barely in ministry for a month, while others on the verge of retirement. It could have been a room of educators, executives, healthcare providers, laborers, tradespeople, salespeople, students ... We all share the same visions of what is lovely, and we all share the same kinds of challenges – the details and circumstances may be different, but the fundamentals are the same.



As I reflected on the various things that were lovely, they were all things for which we can be thankful ... family and friends; the beauty of God's creation, especially at this time of the year as the leaves change colors; security; peaceful times and spaces; goals and accomplishments; permission to be genuine and authentic; homes and pets;

healthy bodies, minds, and spirits; a sense of joy in one's work ... It's easy to be thankful for the lovely things.



But, as we think about challenges, we lose that sense of thankfulness, we become consumed with the negativity, with the heartache and pain, with the anger; we become exhausted and tired; we no longer have patience or understanding; we can no longer see clearly; we may even be consumed with guilt. And yet, in the midst of the challenges, or because of the challenges, God is there with us. God walks with us, God carries us, even if we can't seem to find him, even if we choose not to acknowledge his presence.



As we look back on the challenges, after we get past the pain, sorrow, or heartache, we may just find something to be thankful for – for God's presence during that time, for a new path, a new discovery, a new opportunity that we would not have found or known if things were always good and lovely.

This month we traditionally gather with loved ones around a table filled with turkey, mashed potatoes & gravy, stuffing, candied yams, and pumpkin pie, and we give thanks. As we gather with family and friends, as we gather as a community of faith, this year let us think of things that are lovely in our lives, but also think of the challenges we are facing ... and give thanks ... thanks to a good and gracious God who is with us in the beauty and also in the muck ... who has given us life, claimed us as his own, and promised never to leave us – not in the lovely times, not in the challenging times!

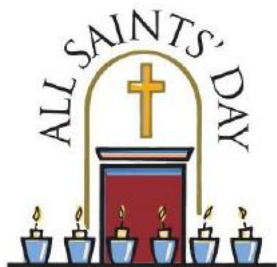

Nominations

It’s getting to be that time – time to lift up new leaders for our mission and ministry. We will be seeking leaders willing to share their time and talent with the Congregation Council, Mission Endowment Fund, Synod Assembly,

Building Projects Update!

We continue to move forward with plans for updates and repairs to our building and grounds. There are a number of projects involved – so, here's an update!

1. Three projects were approved in early June. **The flat roof will be delayed until spring** due to the number of roofs damaged in the late July hailstorm. The contractor will honor the price as agreed, and we expect the work to begin in late March or early April.

The new lighting in the front of the church has been completed and is great! It lights the walkway, and even out into the sidewalk. Just what we wanted! **The tuckpointing will be completed in early spring.** Again, the price will not change from the cost authorized in June.

The cost of all three items is right around \$150,000.

2. The storm damage involves several items. **The windows on the lower level of the church have been replaced,** and the insurance has covered that cost. **A small piece of stained glass above the altar that was cracked is being replaced,** and we expect insurance to cover that cost as well.

The siding on the steeple, the pitched roof of the church, and the roofs of the rental home, and garage, will be taken care of in early spring. The siding should be covered fully.

The roofs are insured at actual cash value. The pitched roof was in our 5-6-year plan. The estimated cost in shingles was \$60,000+, while a metal roof would be about \$104,000. The initial insurance estimated payout

was fairly generous, but either way will require additional funding. We do not know at this time the final amount we will need to cover, nor have we determined if we want a shingle roof or a metal roof on the church structure, but either way, it will be significantly less than the cost of the roof. This moves the project up in time, but also covers a significant part of the cost.

The final cost of the roof replacements (pitched roof, house, and garage) is not yet known, but we expect it to be somewhere around \$20,000 for shingle, and probably \$60,000 or more for metal.

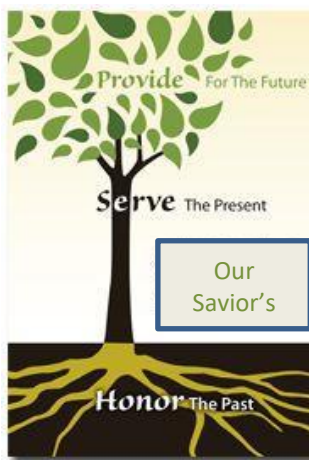
3. **The ceiling tiles in the Gathering Area will be replaced after the roof work is completed.** We hope to make that an “inside job,” with a work day to replace the tiles ourselves. The anticipated cost is around \$2,000.
4. **The organ continues to show its age and** it is apparent that after we address the roofs, **we will need to consider the organ.** A task force has begun to examine a new instrument. *The cost will be somewhere between \$40,000 and \$50,000. This would be a great memorial gift.* Anyone game?
5. The other items in our long-range plan, the **parking lots and the air conditioning, will need to wait** until the other projects are completed and resources are available. At current pricing the cost would be close to \$145,000.

So, where do we stand? At the present time, we have about \$50,000 to begin with, and have received, between pledges and gifts, another \$50,000. Our hope is to continue this appeal for a three-year period, so there is plenty of time to join with us in making future ministry possible through the resource of a healthy building.

So ... **thank you!** Your gifts to the capital campaign and the building fund bring us closer to our goal. We are grateful for all who have so far made contributions to the capital appeal.

Ways to Give to the Endowment

Well, let's start with ... your will. The primary way (though not the only way) we can make gifts to the Mission Endowment Fund is in our wills or living trusts. BUT, these gifts cannot be made if you do not have a will or living trust. The federal government says that 70% of the Americans that die each year do not have a will.

You may have many reasons why you have not made a will – we have all either heard or used, “I am too busy,” “They are too expensive” or “I do not need a will yet,” as an excuse to put off making a will. If you do not have an up-to-date will or living trust, your estate may not go to the persons in your life who need your continued financial support after your death. Further, the ministries you have supported in your life may not receive your money in death. Ask yourself if a will or living trust is a special opportunity to both witness and carry out your faith. As you think about your life and your estate, like so many other Christians, you will surely answer that question “yes.”

Congregation Council

The Congregation Council met on Monday, October 9, with President Jeff Haldeman presiding.

At this meeting the council:

- Shared in devotions based on Psalm 46:10a.
- Approved the minutes from the September meeting, and received financials for September and the pastors' reports.
- Heard reports on a number of congregational ministries.
- Heard that the signage task force is preparing recommendations to the council.
- Heard that the fall stewardship emphasis is in process and agreed to sign letters going out to the congregation.
- Several members stepped forward to transport quilts and kits to the loading spot in La Crosse later in the week.
- Received an update on the building work, storm damage, and the capital campaign.
- Heard that the parking lot probably should not receive a fresh load of gravel this close to winter. Instead, Jeff Haldeman will seek a quote for filling the holes with the plan to resurface in spring.
- Authorized soap and sanitizers installed for the lower level kitchen dishwasher.
- Heard an update of the Living Faith Partnership with Bethany Lutheran Church, Mauston.
- Approved request for Pastor Jon to have a sabbatical in summer of 2024.
